One year old

- Babbles long strings of sounds (ba-ba-ba)
- Uses gestures like waving and reaching
- Follows the directions of your point
- Plays games like peek-a-boo
- Actively listens to songs and stories
- Says single words like: "Hi," "More," or "Uh-oh."



Two years old

- Puts two words together like: "More eat" or "Play bubbles"
- Asks questions such as: "Where's dada?"
- Responds to simple questions like: "Where are your shoes?"
- Points to pictures in a book when you name them
- Uses sounds p, b, m, h, and w



Three years old

- Puts three words together
- Asks, "Why?"
- Follows two-step directions
- Uses prepositions such as: in, on, and under
- Uses sounds k, g, f, n, t



Four years old

- Uses possessives and plurals
- Uses present progressive verb (e.g is running)
- Identifies if words rhyme or don't rhyme
- Completely intelligible to unfamiliar people
- Tells multisentence stories about events that happened



Five years old

- Uses sounds ch, sh, and L
- Correctly uses regular past tense (e.g. jumped)
- Answers why and how questions
- Uses comparative (e.g. bigger)
- Ends conversations appropriately
